OF CHRISTIAN PARENTING

Though scores of wonderful books have been written on this vital subject of childrearing, the Bible, *that perfectly divinely inspired book*, always remains the authority, foundation and guide for 'parental instruction.' The Holy Scriptures contain the A to Z principles that provide the power for applying heavenly wisdom in every situation. (Content below is compiled & arranged by *Mike Vestel*)

"If the title of this article leads one to think that parenting is easy, please forgive me. Let me go on record as saying, Parenting Definitely Is Not Easy. But the following alphabetized stream of thoughts and practical tips will help us to be better Christian parents if we are willing to daily apply them to ourselves. One of the greatest questions we can ask ourselves as Christian parents is, ***"What shall it profit a mom and dad if they gain the whole world and lose their own children?"***

"A" Attention. How we need to redeem the time as parents! → Eph. 5:16.

"B" Balance. If our children would grow as Jesus grew, what remarkable success we would have as parents? (Lk 2:40, 52) They need to see balance in us.

"C" Compromise. Not in our spiritual training, but to favor our children's needs, schedules, and opinions (Eph. 6:4).

"D" Discipline. Children are to be disciplined (Prov. 19:18) by parents who are disciplined (1 Tim 4:7; Heb. 12:6-11).

"E" Encouragement. If 'Barnabas' means "son of encouragement," (Acts 4:36) we need more parents who are fathers/mothers of encouragement (I Thess. 5:11).

"F" Fun. Children must be taught the times & places for good, clean fun! Parents who don't play with their children neglect one of life's greatest blessings.

"G" Godliness. When parents exhibit God-like-ness, children will find the example our Father desperately desires that they have (1 Tim. 6:6; Col. 1:27).

"H" Helper. Children must know they are loved and needed. They need to see themselves as "God's helper," "Daddy's helper," and "Mommy's helper." Small amounts of responsibility can do much to help a child's esteem. (Matt. 7:12).

"I" Inventory. Parents must regularly take inventory of themselves. "Am I the kind of father/mother that God wants and that my child/children need?" (2Cor. 13:5; 2 Pet 1:10).

"J" Joy. Children are a gift of God (Ps. 127:3). We should joyfully teach them and fill their hearts with joy too! (1Jn 1:4).

"K" Know. Know your child's fears, phobias, likes, loves, and dislikes. After all, our children are part of us! It is truly a shame for our own flesh and blood to almost be unknown to us – to be complete strangers (Note 1 Tim. 3:5 and the qualification for elders to "know how to manage" their households).

"L" Love. As the Heavenly Father loves His children, godly parents will strive to love theirs. We are to love in deed and in truth (1Jn 3:18). Loving one's own children naturally increases to immeasurable dimensions the more one tries to comprehend the magnificent love of God to the offering of His Son for us. Love motivates all our dealings. (Lk 15:11-32).

"M" Memory. God has created man with a remarkable capacity to remember, and what a blessing it is to have memories to stir us up regarding our children (**2 Peter 1:12, 13**). We are making memories with them every day – memories that can never be reproduced to exactly the same way again. Cherish them! **"N" Nipping** things in the bud. The word “no” is one of the most powerful and necessary words in a parent’s vocabulary. If some things aren’t nipped in the bud, the blossoms they produce will be ugly and poisonous (**Eph. 6:4**).

"O" Order. All things are to be done decently and in order (**I Cor. 14:40**). Sadly in too many families there is a conspicuous lack of any order. Is the only “orderly” thing about your home the fact that there is no order within it? Is the only “orderly” thing about your home the fact that there is no order within it?

"P" Patience. Parents need patience, for their sake and for theirs’! (**Heb. 10:36; 1 Tim. 6:11**). Without it seen in us, they will not grow this, and other godly traits in themselves. To encourage a parents to be more patient, simply remind them of God’s patience with them!

"Q" Questions. Children can ask more questions than anyone else on earth! They can also ask the same question over and over until your patience is again tested. Jesus repeatedly dealt with the questions of others, even when the motive behind them was far less than sincere. Don’t just let your children ask questions – encourage it! The education you’ll be providing them (and yourself) will be worth the gray hairs such questions may bring on.

"R" Respect. Children must be taught respect for God, His Word, and for others. A lack of respect for authority promotes rebellion, while a proper respect for it promotes humility and subjection (**Eph. 5:21; 1 Pet. 5:5**)

"S" Stability. In this age of insecurity and change, our children want and need a sure foundation. They need to see in us a strength of purpose and resolution to live right and do right (**1 Cor. 15:58**).

"T" Thanksgiving. Do our children see us “*giving God thanks for all things?*” (**Eph. 5:20**) Or do they often find us murmuring about the affairs of life? (**Phil. 2:2-3**). We are instructed to be thankful (**Col. 3:15**). To fail to exhibit real thanksgiving in our lives is characteristic of a pagan, pessimistic people, which we know God abhors! (**Rom. 1:21**).

"U" Unfinished. Like Paul, (in a slightly different context) we “*do not regard ourselves as having laid hold*” (**Phil. 3:13**). Even when children become adults, we will still be their parents. A parent’s counsel, wisdom, and love will always be valued by godly children.

"V" Valued. To show the value of mankind, God paid the ultimate price – He gave His unique, only Son! (**John 3:16**) Do our children know how much we love them, value them, and care for them? Some children, living daily with this huge, lingering void, go miserably astray just to have someone express some concern for them!

"W" Wisdom. How we need God’s Word in our heart (**Deut. 6:6**) and His wisdom in our heads in bringing up young people. “Acquire wisdom! Acquire understanding!” said a wise father to his sons (**Prov. 4:1**). (He knew they’d need it when they became parents!)

"X" X-Factor. The “X-FACTOR” is prayer. How we need to pray for strength as parents, and how we need to pray for our children to develop into the strong servants of God. There are many temptations out there for young people, and our prayers are one of the strongest helps in fighting sin.

"Y" Yes. Contrary to some children’s beliefs, this word is in a parent’s vocabulary! Every now and then, we should say it (the shock on their faces will probably be worth it!).

"Z" Zeal. Young people should see parents with a zeal for God (**Rom. 12:11**), a zeal for living, loving and serving (**Col. 3:23**). If we are Christians believe Christianity is the best way of life, let’s make sure our children are a zealous, working faith in us.

A LITTLE HISTORY OF MOTHERS' DAY



“MOTHER MATTERS”

(Nelson's Preacher Resource Book 2010)

In the United States, Mother's Day started nearly 160 years ago, when Anna Jarvis, an Appalachian homemaker, organized a day to raise awareness of poor health conditions in her community, a cause she believed would be best advocated by mothers. She called it "Mother's-Work Day." . . . In 1905 when Anna Jarvis died, her daughter, also named Anna, began a campaign to memorialize the life work of her mother. Legend has it that young Anna remembered a Sunday school lesson that her mother gave in which she said, "I hope and pray that someone, sometime, will found a memorial mother's day. There are many days for men, but none for mothers." Anna began to lobby prominent businessmen like John Wanamaker, and politicians including Presidents Taft and Roosevelt to support her campaign to create a special day to honor mothers. At one of the first services organized to celebrate Anna's mother in 1908, at her church in West Virginia, Anna handed out her mother's favorite flower, the white carnation.

Five years later, the House of Representatives adopted a resolution calling for officials of the federal government to wear white carnations on Mother's Day. In 1914 Anna's hard work paid off when Woodrow Wilson signed a bill [for the nation to recognize] Mother's Day. While at first, most people wrote simple, well-meaning letters of appreciation to their mothers, this quickly changed. Jarvis eventually became disgruntled in the 1920s as the day became more commercialized. (feel free to talk later about that) She even filed a lawsuit trying to get the day removed from the calendar. Most everyone can relate to the charges of over commercialization. But still, above all people, mothers deserve the recognition and sincere expressions of appreciation. They are, after all, a very special breed. As the poet William Ross Wallace once stated in the title of a poem he penned as a tribute to mothers back in 1865, "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle Is the Hand That Rules the World."

SERMON: *Thank God for godly Mothers!*

TEXT: Proverbs 6:20-22

INTRODUCTION: Mother's Wisdom is Priceless!

1. COUNSEL by godly Mothers is penetrating (vs.20, "My son, keep your father's command, and do not forsake the law of your mother." (NKJV)). Cf. Prov. 4:6-7; 15:20; 23:25.

- ♦ This verse instructs children to listen and obey the counsel of godly parents, especially mothers (cf. Eph. 6:1-3). Josh 24:15; 2 Tim. 3:14-15; Luke 2:50-51

Wisdom of Mothers! JOY – faithful/heaven-3 Jn 4

"I have no great joy to hear that my children walk in truth."

- ♦ Children blessed with godly parents will be advised based on the Word of God and the God of the Word!

2. CONNECTION to godly Mothers is priceless (vs.21, "Bind them continually upon your heart; tie them around your neck." (NKJV)). Cf. Prov. 1:8-9. Keep them constantly in view!

- ♦ Binding godly counsel on our heart means to meditate upon it and assimilate it into our actions. We must connect to godly counsel! 1 Thess. 2:7, "as a nursing mother tenderly cares for her own children."
- ♦ We must weave ("tie") godly counsel into the fabric of our life. It must permeate our life & our actions!

Love God, Church, Bible, truth. Kind, merciful, gracious, pure, holy – faith NT Christian/heaven home!

3. COURSE of godly Mothers is pure (vs.22, "If when you roam, they will lead you; when you sleep, they will keep you; and when you awake, they will speak with you."). Deut. 11:18-21

- **LEAD**—Psalm 119:105. We do not know where to step without godly guidance from God's Word and God's people (Jer. 10:23). WOG is food, shelter & clothing!
- **KEEP**—Phil. 4:6-9. The peace of God guards us and the God of peace guides us.
- **TEACH**—Deut. 6:4-9. God's Word must be so central to family that we naturally focus completely on Him while engaged in all activity.

7. So God made a mother Worthy: Ephesians 6:2. The Proverb is true: "Her children rise up and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praises her."
8. So God made a mother Unforgettable: Proverbs 1:8-10. Many things need to be forgotten, some things we can't forget, but a loving mother is unforgettable.

Conclusion: We've seen it on cards, heard it in a sermon, and read it in books—Abraham Lincoln's tribute to his mother: "All that I am, or hope to be, I owe to my angel mother." AMEN!

Thank God for Mothers!

TEXT: 2 Timothy 1:5; 3:14-15

Intro: The *head* of the home is the father, but the *heart* of the home is the mother!

1. **The Source of Her Faith (3:16).** Scripture is both Inspired and Profitable!
2. **The Sincerity of Her Faith (1:5).** Genuine faith is faith based on fact; solid rock faith produces solid rock lives.
3. **The Sharing of Her Faith (1:5; 3:14).** Faith that saved is faith that obeys and is worth giving away (i.e., sharing).
4. **The Salvation of Her Faith (3:15).** Scripture (i.e., sacred writings) produces wisdom and the wisest things is life is eternal life.

Conclusion: Thank God for godly mothers! Their heart is set on their children mentally, physically, spiritually, and socially. May God continue to bless this world with mothers with Mary's character, integrity, and grace.

SERMON: Magnificent Motherhood!

TEXT: 2 Timothy 1:5; 3:14-15

Introduction: Mothers are the most powerful and influential force on the face of the earth. One of life's greatest blessings is to have a godly mother and one of the greatest gifts is to be a godly mother.

Proposition: What is necessary for mothers to transfer faith to the next generation? See - Deuteronomy 6:6; Psalm 78:4-7.

1. A faith that is **SINCERE** (2 Timothy 1:5). Sincere faith is not an act but completely genuine, unhypocritical and without pretense or deceit. Timothy enjoyed the great blessing of having a godly heritage, even though it was only one parent and one grandparent who contributed. It will be a great joy to meet Lois and Eunice in Heaven! Sincere faith is the most important thing we can pass on to our children. In fact, the values we leave in our children are more important than the variables we leave to them. The character of our children tomorrow depends on what we put into their hearts today. Faithful mothers, thank you! This is true "joy of faith" (Phil. 1:25).

2. A faith that is **MODELED** (2 Timothy 3:14). Modeled faith is faith that can be followed (1 Cor 11:1). Paul tells Timothy to remember from what sort of people his knowledge had come. The pronoun "whom" is plural which would include the OT prophets ("speaking" through the Scripture), Timothy's grandmother Eunice, his mother Lois (2 Tim. 1:5), and his mentor Paul (2 Tim. 1:13, 2:2, 3:10). Thus, the content of teaching is important, but so too is the character of the teacher. Consistent living that matches clear teaching will produce greater success. We must consistently back up the words of our lips with the works of our life! "Lord, give us more trustworthy teachers (i.e., Eunice, Lois, Paul) and a firm foundation (i.e., the holy scriptures)!" Faithful mothers, thank you! After all, you cannot impart what you do not possess!

3. A faith that is **DEDICATED** (2 Timothy 3:15). The main way our children will grow up to love and serve the Lord is to instill in them from an early age the importance of reading, studying, memorizing and obeying God's Word. FACT: God's Word is powerful to save (James 1:16). FACT: God's Word is powerful to sanctify (John 17:17). FACT: Salvation is built on the knowledge of the truth revealed in Scripture. Children must know these facts! They must know more than Jesus as friend; they must know what God's Word reveals about the condition of their hearts, that they are rebellious and disobedient toward God. They must know more than the loving God, they must know that He is holy and just, and that He will bring terrible, everlasting punishment on those who do not turn from their sins and obey Jesus. Our children need to see us apply God's Word in such a way that it changes our lives for time and eternity (Rom. 12:2). This takes a dedicated faith! Faithful mothers, thank you! "Thank you for teaching me about Jesus!"

Conclusion: There are few greater joys parents can experience than seeing their children walk with God. Through faith in God and by honoring His Word, godly mothers have tremendous influence as they train their children. Faithful mothers, thank you! As Abraham Lincoln once said, "All that I am or ever hope to be, I owe to my angel Mother." Read Proverbs 6:20-22.

SERMON: Thank God for godly Mothers!

TEXT: Proverbs 6:20-22

INTRODUCTION: Mother's Wisdom is Priceless!

1. **COUNSEL by godly Mothers** (vs.20, "My son, keep your father's command, and do not forsake the law of your mother." [men]). Cf. Prov. 4:6-7; 15:20; 23:25.
 - This verse instructs children to listen and obey the counsel of godly parents, especially mothers (cf. Eph. 6:1-3).

- Children blessed with godly parents will be advised based on the Word of God and the God of the Word!

2. **CONNECTION to godly Mothers** (vs.21, "Bind them continually upon your heart; tie them around your neck." [men]). Cf. Prov. 1:8-9.
 - Binding godly counsel on our heart means to meditate upon it and assimilate it into our actions. We must connect to godly counsel!

- We must weave ("tie") godly counsel into the fabric of our life.

3. **COURE of godly Mothers** (vs.22, "When you sleep, they will lead you; when you sleep, they will keep you; and when you awake, they will speak with you." [men]). Cf. Deut. 11:18-21

- LEAD—Psalm 119:105. We do not know where to step without godly guidance from God's Word and God's people (Jer. 10:23).
- KEEP—Phil. 4:6-9. The peace of God guards us and the God of peace guides us.
- TEACH—Deut. 6:4-9. God's Word must be so central to family that they naturally talk about Him while engaged in all activity.

- C. I would remember that saying "I can" and looking for the silver lining in the cloud is crucial (Philippians 4:13; Psalm 27:13).

V. I would emphasize to my children that they should love all people regardless of how they act.

- A. I would want my children to know that love is the greatest Christian attribute (I Corinthians 13:1-3,13; I Peter 4:8).
- B. I would emphasize to my children how Jesus loved (John 11:36; Luke 23:34).
- C. I would stress over and over again that a meaningful life, free from envy, anger, and hate, is found in loving everyone.

VI. I would insist that my children choose the right kind of friends.

- A. I would do my very best to get my children to see the dangers of the wrong crowd (Proverbs 13:20; I Corinthians 15:33).
- B. I would constantly emphasize the importance of wholesome activities.
- C. I would speak against alcohol and other drug use often.

VII. I would make my children fully understand that selfishness is the ugliest sin of all.

- A. I would want my children to know that a happy life is a giving life (Acts 20:35).
- B. I would want my children to know that selfishness destroys friendships and especially marriages.
- C. I would want my children to know that doing for others is their mission in life (Matthew 20:28).

Conclusion: Your job is not easy. What the world needs is great young parents. Pay the price and one day you will be proud you did.
